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Youth	refers to mental health needs then there is targeted intervention. Grantees include CHCs with behavioral health protocols.  (Sato) Behavioral health clients may need more NRTs. Can marketing and promotion be coordinated with community health centers for high and middle school students to MLMQ – in-house screens available. CHCs make referrals and need bi-directional feedback loop with HTQL.  (Char-Lum) Are you working with Hawaii organizations like H5 and others? Response: Working with HIPHI and creating Hawaii-specific campaigns, and there are effective campaigns from Illinois and UCSF has peer-to-peer social support program that appears promising.
