During Quarter 2, we served a total of 88 new consumers and provided 108 community service hours across the island.

We saw a significant increase in requests for assistance, particularly during the months of March and April, following the severe weather and flooding events that impacted the community. Many individuals with disabilities and their families experienced substantial disruptions to their homes, personal belongings, medical supplies, and assistive technology.

In response, we mobilized to provide direct support and advocacy to affected people. Services included distributing essential cleaning supplies and materials needed to navigate and clean flood impacted living spaces.

We continue to work with community partners on recovery support by working with the Ford Foundation regarding approved funding intended to further assist individuals with disabilities and their families. We are pleased to coordinate collaboratively with Aloha Independent Living Hawaii to help ensure those resources are utilized effectively.
